

Congress Rules Out Punjab Leadership Change Ahead Of Assembly Polls

Bhupesh Baghel said the Congress high command has already taken its decision and Raja Warring will continue to lead the Punjab unit

Congress general secretary in charge of Punjab, Bhupesh Baghel, has made it clear that there will be no change in the state leadership and that Amarinder Singh Raja Warring will continue as the state Congress president.

Rejecting speculation over a leadership change, Baghel said, "Appointing a Congress president is not a game of 'gudda-guddi' (playing with dolls). The party high command's decision will not be changed."

He said the Congress high command has already taken its decision and Raja Warring will continue to lead the Punjab unit.

Baghel also asserted that there is no tradition in the Congress of reversing decisions taken by the party leadership.

According to Baghel, District Congress

Committee presidents and Punjab Congress Committee members have unanimously welcomed the high command's decision. He added that party leaders also congratulated the newly appointed working presidents,



reflecting organisational unity.

The remarks came during Baghel's visit to Punjab, where he held meetings with District Congress Committee presidents, senior

leaders and party office-bearers to review the organisation's preparedness ahead of the 2027 Punjab Assembly elections.

Baghel stressed that the party's focus is on strengthening the organisation at the grassroots level and ensuring all leaders work together.

He said the Congress wants to build a united organisation instead of getting distracted by internal differences.

On senior leaders Charanjit Singh Channi and Sukhjinder Singh Randhawa, Baghel said he had already spoken to both of them and would meet them soon. "If needed, I will personally visit their homes and meet them over a cup of tea," he said.

With Baghel's statement, the Congress leadership has sought to end speculation over the Punjab Congress chief's post, reaffirming that Raja Warring will continue to head the state unit while the party focuses on strengthening its organisation ahead of the next Assembly elections.

Mocked for feasting on kachori, noodles as Wangchuk fasts, CJP's Dipke clarifies

With activist Sonam Wangchuk's indefinite hunger strike at New Delhi's Jantar Mantar completing its 10th day on Tuesday, the spotlight shifted from the protest to what Cockroach Janta Party (CJP) founder Abhijeet Dipke has been eating. Clips of Dipke eating bread pakodas and noodles have gone viral on social media, triggering memes and taunts. Critics have questioned why Wangchuk was fasting while CJP's Dipke or his associates were not. Some people have even mocked Dipke for having food on the stage beside Wangchuk, who is on an indefinite fast. On Sunday, Dipke was seen eating kachori sitting right next to Wangchuk. Amid the criticism, Dipke addressed the issue in an interaction with Delhi Tak, India Today Digital's sister platform.



He insisted the videos were being circulated out of context and said the party's core team had consciously stayed off the hunger strike so that the protest could continue to function. He also expressed concern over Wangchuk's deteriorating health, saying he had "urged him to end the fast, but the activist had refused to do so". Sonam Wangchuk, whose indefinite hunger strike entered its 10th day on Tuesday, joined the Abhijeet Dipke-led CJP's protest, demanding the resignation of Union Education Minister Dharmendra Pradhan over exam paper leaks.

No evidence linking India to Hardeep Singh Nijjar killing, says Canada

The Canadian police said on Wednesday that there is no evidence linking Indian government officials to the 2023 killing of Canadian citizen and Khalistani separatist Hardeep Singh Nijjar, nearly three years after former Prime Minister Justin Trudeau alleged security agencies were probing credible allegations of a "potential link" between Indian agents and the murder. The development came as newly unsealed indictments by the US Department of Justice identified gangster Lawrence Bishnoi as responsible for Nijjar's killing. "There is no evidence to suggest that through this organised crime syndicate investigation and the charges laid forward that Indian government officials would be charged or involved in this....nothing has come out to link the Indian government," Lisa Moreland, Deputy Commissioner, Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP), told Canadian TV channel CBC News.

Jaishankar meets Bahrain's Dy PM Khalid bin Abdulla Al Khalifa

External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar, who is on a four-nation Gulf tour, on Tuesday met Bahrain's Deputy Prime Minister Khalid bin Abdulla Al Khalifa on Tuesday.

The meeting came a day after Jaishankar held an audience with Bahrain's King Hamad bin Isa Al



Khalifa and Crown Prince and Prime Minister Salman bin Hamad Al Khalifa.

"A pleasure to meet Deputy Prime Minister of Bahrain H.E Khalid bin Abdulla Al Khalifa this morning. Discussed taking forward our bilateral cooperation across various sectors. Also exchanged views on the regional situation," Jaishankar posted on X on Tuesday.

Jaishankar arrived in Bahrain on Monday from Qatar. He is on the second leg of his four-nation Gulf visit from July 5 to 10, which also includes Kuwait and Oman.

Death Trade Under the Shade of Khaki: Tainted Constable 'Hanu Kamadiya' Out on Bail

Amit Shah reviews Maharashtra, Gujarat rain crisis, assures full support from Centre

Union Home Minister Amit Shah on Wednesday spoke separately to Maharashtra Chief Minister Devendra Fadnavis and Gujarat Chief Minister Bhupendra Patel to review the situation caused by heavy rain in the two states, officials said.

During the calls, Shah assured both chief ministers of all possible assistance from the Centre in dealing with the rain-related situation. The review came as torrential rain disrupted daily life and train services in Mumbai, while southern Gujarat reported extremely heavy rainfall, five rain-related deaths and large-scale evacuations from flooded areas.

Mumbai witnessed heavy rain on Wednesday, delaying local train services and causing inconvenience to office-goers. The city had been battered by rain over the weekend before getting a brief respite on Tuesday.

Long-distance train services towards Gujarat remained disrupted because of waterlogging on the Vasai-Virar section in neighbouring Palghar district and at several places in south Gujarat. Operations on the Mumbai-Pune route were also yet to be fully restored after landslides in the Bor Ghat section on Monday.

Civic officials said Tulsi Lake, one of the seven reservoirs that supply drinking water to Mumbai, started overflowing late



at night following heavy rainfall in its catchment area. The India Meteorological Department has forecast intermittent light to moderate rainfall in Mumbai and the suburbs during the day.

Southern Gujarat also received extremely heavy rain on Tuesday, with Surat district being the worst hit. Officials said five

people died in rain-related incidents and 2,100 people were moved from flooded areas to safe places. Kamrej taluka in Surat district recorded 305 mm of rainfall in the 10 hours ending 4 pm on Tuesday.

Schools and colleges in Navsari district and Surat remained shut on Tuesday in view of the downpour. In its midday state forecast on Tuesday, the IMD said, "Extremely heavy rainfall occurred at isolated places in the districts of South Gujarat region, namely Surat, Valsad, Dadra & Nagar Haveli in the last 24 hours."

Speaking to reporters, Surat Municipal Corporation Commissioner M Nagarajan had said around 2,100 people had been relocated from different zones to safe shelters.

Manesar begins groundwork for waste-to-energy plant

MCM has initiated groundwork towards the proposed waste-to-energy (WTE) plant, initiating the process to fence the remaining 10 acres of land earmarked for the project in Kasan village. Once operational, the facility will process municipal solid waste (MSW) — everyday household and commercial garbage — and convert it into energy.

“Out of 20 acres of land, we got possession of 10 acres of land first that was already fenced. We have now got possession of the remaining 10 acres of land on which now the work will begin. Fencing will be completed in 15 to 20 days,” said MCM executive engineer Nijesh Kumar.

On Tuesday, the civic body floated a tender to hire an agency for fencing the 10-acre parcel recently acquired by HSIIDC for the project.

The project gained momentum in March when the directorate of urban local bodies (ULB) constituted a committee to prepare a model request for proposal (RFP) for waste-to-energy projects in major municipal corporations, including Gurgaon, Faridabad and Hisar. According to ULB officials, the project will be developed under the public-private partnership (PPP) model. The Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs has also issued a model RFP to assist states and ULBs in structuring technically viable and financially sustainable waste-to-energy projects. The committee has been tasked with carrying out techno-economic and feasibility reports, identifying suitable sites, assessing waste generation, and planning the power purchase agreement (PPA) framework. It will also estimate project costs, evaluate environmental requirements and outline mechanisms for the disposal of residual waste.

Vehicle thief shot at in gunfight in Noida, his minor aide detained

A suspected vehicle thief was injured in a gunfight with police and his juvenile accomplice was also detained on Tuesday. Police said the duo had recently stolen a car near GIP Mall and a motorcycle from Atta Market. According to additional DCP Manisha Singh, cops were conducting routine vehicle checks near GIP Mall when a white Maruti Swift Dzire approached and was asked to stop. The driver fled towards Sadarpur, prompting a police chase. The suspects allegedly abandoned the car near the forest area in Sector 42 and attempted to escape on foot. The main accused, Bhanu (22), allegedly opened fire at cops and sustained a bullet wound to the leg during retaliatory firing before being taken into custody. Cops also detained his juvenile accomplice. Police seized a country-made pistol, one spent cartridge and a live round from Bhanu, while his accomplice was allegedly carrying an illegal knife. Officers also recovered a stolen Hero Splendor motorcycle that did not have a number plate. The Swift Dzire recovered from the accused was stolen from near GIP Mall on July 6, while the motorcycle was allegedly stolen from Atta Market two days earlier. The accused are being questioned about their possible involvement in

Fire breaks out at shoe showroom, no injuries

A fire broke out at a shoe showroom in Ghantaghar on Tuesday evening. The cause of the fire, which took place at the Wings Shoes showroom around 5pm, is not known. No injury has been reported. Chief fire officer (CFO) Rahul Pal said, “It took around two hours to control the situation. A total of 11 vehicles were present at this fire. No loss of life occurred. We are trying to identify the cause of the fire, but it is suspected that a short circuit could be the reason behind the incident. The information was shared with Kotwali fire station. All fire tenders, along with the Kotwali fire officer, were dispatched to the spot. The fire broke out on the fourth floor of the building, where shoes were stored. On the terrace, generator sets as well as the fuel were kept, due to which fire surrounded the area quickly.” Six fire tenders were sent from Kotwali fire station, two others were called from Vaishali and the remaining tenders were called from different fire stations of Ghaziabad, the CFO said, adding, the fire service unit started firefighting by spreading hose lines up to the rooftops of nearby buildings. Due to intense heat and smoke inside the building, fire personnel wore breathing apparatus sets and entered the building to carry out firefighting.

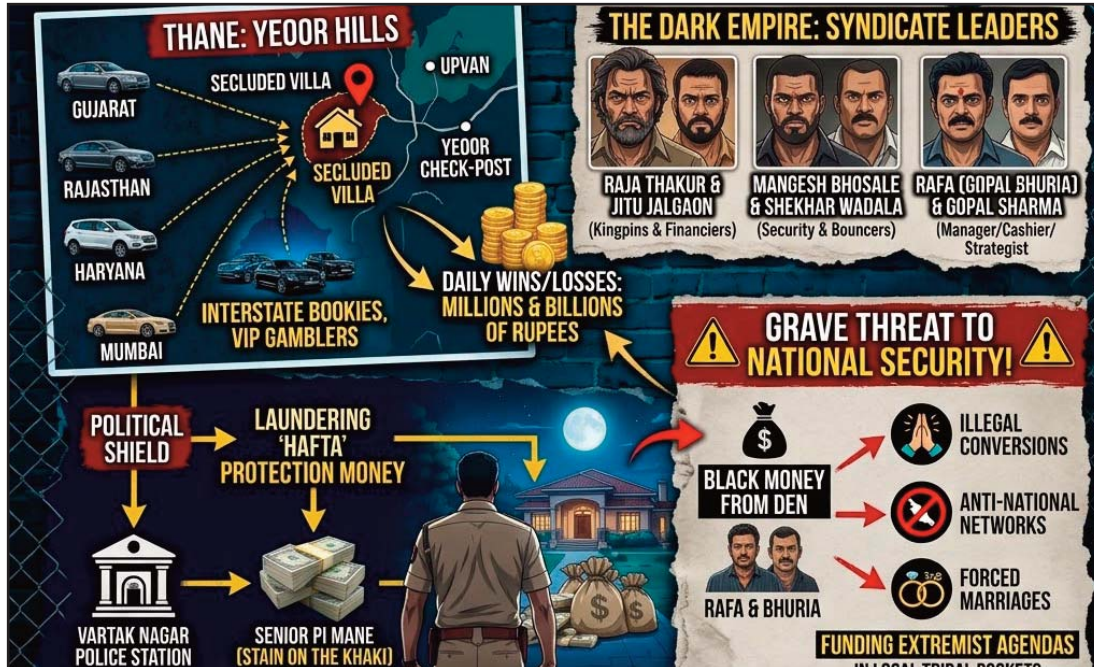
India's Biggest 'Gambling Syndicate' Busted in Thane

Illegal Mini-Casino Thriving in Yeoor Hills; Billions Extorted Daily

Palghar: THANE: While grand claims are being made about transforming Thane city adjacent to Mumbai into a 'Smart City', the law and order system is being brazenly torn to shreds right under its nose. The budget session of the Maharashtra Legislative Assembly is underway, with lengthy debates taking place inside the house regarding state security. However, just a few kilometers away from the assembly, the illicit operations active within the jurisdiction of the Vartak Nagar Police Station have put the entire Home Department in the dock. According to highly accurate and explosive information obtained from reliable sources and extensive investigative groundwork, a highly secure, luxurious villa situated right behind the Upvan area and near the Yeoor check-post has been converted into an interstate 'Mini-Casino'. The law holds no ground here. Only two things rule this place — decks of cards and stacks of cash! This is no ordinary local gambling den; it is a corporate-style, interstate betting syndicate. According to concrete information available to us, wins and losses running into millions and billions of rupees occur at this venue every single day. Astonishingly, those placing bets here include not just local players, but major diamond merchants from Gujarat's markets, prominent bookies from Rajasthan, land mafias from Haryana, and influential white-collar criminals and industrialists from Mumbai, Nashik, and Jalgaon. When the luxury vehicles of these VIP gamblers cross the Yeoor check-post under the cover of night, Vartak Nagar Police patrolling vans frequently alter their routes. Due to the alleged misuse of the Chief Minister's Office (CMO) name, the local police have not been able to muster up the courage to execute a raid. The framework of this illegal empire has been engineered in a highly cunning and dangerous manner. The operators driving this syndicate command significant influence within Thane's underworld and political circles:

1. Raja Thakur and Jitu Jalgaon: They are the actual kingpins and primary financiers of this black market business. Inside this villa, their word is the absolute law.
2. Mangesh Bhosale and Shekhar Wadala: These individuals have been assigned the responsibility of managing the venue's security, deploying bouncers, and protecting the operation from external threats or potential raids by honest officers.
3. Rafa (Ghodi Bhuria) and Gopal Sharma (Manager): Gopal Sharma operates as the chief strategist and 'cashier' of this club.



Sources allege that his primary job extends beyond facilitating gambling; he handles the intricate liaisoning of the multi-million rupee monthly protection money ('Hafta') distributed to top officials in the police and administration.

The Sensational Political Connection: According to circulating political whispers and insider reports, the main mastermind, Raja Thakur, projects himself as an incredibly close aide and the 'right-hand man' of top state leadership (at the Deputy Chief Minister level). Utilizing this political shield, he has reportedly forced the entire Thane police machinery to dance to his tunes. As the investigation dug deeper into the roots of this racket, a terrifying angle emerged that extends far beyond gambling or betting, striking directly at the nation's internal security.

Explosive Revelation: Sources have revealed that a massive chunk of the black money generated from this gambling den is being funneled through the managers, Rafa and Bhuria, into nearby impoverished and tribal pockets to fund illegal religious conversion networks and forced marriage syndicates. Furthermore, serious apprehensions have surfaced regarding potential links between Rafa, Bhuria, and certain anti-national and extremist organizations. This tainted money is actively being weaponized to disrupt the social fabric of the country. The question is not merely that this den is operational; the question is, under whose active patronage is it thriving? It is virtually impossible that such a massive illegal operation is taking place right under the nose of Vartak Nagar Police Station's Senior PI Mane, near the Yeoor check-post under his ju-

isdiction, without his knowledge. Sources directly allege that bags loaded with cash are delivered to this local police station on a daily and weekly basis. Not just the local police, but officers from the Thane Police Commissioner down to the DCP level have been provided with detailed, written intelligence regarding this den. However, when money talks, the conscience of the khaki uniform falls silent. This systemic silence proves that the law enforcement machinery has completely surrendered to these criminals.

'Mahanagar Metro' Asks Direct and Piercing Questions:

1. Does the lack of concrete action, despite the Chief Minister's Office (CMO) receiving confidential intelligence and formal complaints about this den, indicate that a share of this gambling money is reaching the corridors of power?
2. Thane Police Commissioner Sir, will the rule of 'Raja Thakur' and his henchmen prevail over the rule of law under your watch? Where is the dignity of your uniform?
3. Why has Senior PI Mane, who has allowed the country's largest gambling syndicate and anti-national activities to thrive under his watch, not been suspended immediately, and why hasn't an investigation into his disproportionate assets been handed over to the Anti-Corruption Bureau (ACB)?

NH-8 chokes, diversions turn commute into hours-long ordeal

On a day when the first widespread monsoon showers should have brought relief from the heat, they instead delivered a familiar reality check. For thousands, travelling a few kilometres became an exercise in patience rather than distance.

A city synonymous with expressways, corporate towers and premium neighbourhoods found itself merely inching forward as waterlogged roads, flooded intersections and a highway cave-in turned routine commutes into hours-long ordeals. Tuesday afternoon's rain brought traffic to a near standstill across the city, with jams rippling from one arterial road to another. Water accumulated rapidly on key stretches, forcing vehicles to crawl through inundated roads and creating tailbacks that stretched for kilometres. School buses, office cabs, ambulances and private vehicles all found themselves caught in the same gridlock. The worst-hit locations

included Rajeev Chowk, Hero Honda Chowk, Kherki Daula toll plaza, IFFCO Chowk, Signature Tower, Sector 31 market, Mata Mandir Road, Golf Course Road, MG Road, Subhash Chowk, Vatika Chowk, Narsingpur, Basai Road, Bilaspur, Pachgaon, Manesar and the Southern Peripheral Road (SPR). Traffic also slowed considerably near GD Goenka School in Sector 48 after rainwater submerged parts of the carriageway. Golf Course Road — often projected as the city's flagship corridor — became one of the biggest choke points. Long queues of vehicles crept forward bumper-to-bumper, while MG Road witnessed similar scenes. “It took me around 45 minutes to reach the Sector 55-56 Rapid Metro station from Sikanderpur. Normally, it takes 15-20 minutes, but waterlogging reduced traffic to a crawl,” said Shobit Khanna, a resident of Sector 65. The situation worsened around 5pm after a road caved in near Narsingpur on the Delhi-Jaipur

carriageway of NH-8. To ease the mounting congestion, police created three diversions. Vehicles from Delhi



heading towards Jaipur were diverted onto Dwarka Expressway near Mahipalpur. At Rajeev Chowk and Hero Honda Chowk, motorists were redirected via Sohna Road and Southern Peripheral Road.

The diversions, however, shifted the burden rather than reducing it. SPR, already struggling with heavy traffic, became even more congested as diverted vehicles poured onto the corridor. “Gurgaon aain came to a halt after a spell of rain. It took nearly 90

minutes to cover barely 7km from SPR to Sector 46. Every monsoon, commuters are left helpless while authorities promise lasting solutions,” said Vikas Sharma, a resident of Sector 71. Navigation apps mirrored the scale of the disruption, showing travel times exceeding an hour for stretches that ordinarily take less than 20 minutes. Several commuters said it took them nearly an hour to travel just 3-4km, while others spent well over an hour negotiating the roughly 10km stretch between Rajeev Chowk and the Sirhaul toll plaza. The traffic mess also affected schoolchildren. Buses on Sohna Road remained stuck in slow-moving traffic between Subhash Chowk and Vatika Chowk, leaving anxious parents tracking delayed arrivals. Across the city, two-wheelers took shelter beneath flyovers as the rain intensified, while motorists cautiously navigated waterlogged roads to avoid vehicles stalling.

Odisha moves to digitise land registration with paperless, cashless system

Odisha has decided to digitise its land registration services by introducing a fully paperless and cashless registration system across all registration offices in the state, in a major reform enhancing transparency, efficiency and accountability.

Reviewing the proposed reforms, the Revenue and Disaster Management Minister Suresh Pujari said the new system would make the registration process transparent, citizen-friendly and virtually free from corruption by minimising physical interface and eliminating cash transactions.

Buyers and sellers will no longer have to visit registration offices to submit applications after finalising a land transaction. Instead, the entire application process will be completed online, with the parties required to appear before the registering authority only for identity verification and execution of the deed, as mandated under law, the minister informed. The government has also decided to abolish the existing provision permitting cash payments of up to Rs 15,000 towards registration-related charges.

J&K trucker convicted in Tripura under NDPS case

The Additional Sessions Judge in North Tripura convicted a resident of Jammu & Kashmir, after finding him guilty in a drug peddling case, and awarded him 12 years rigorous imprisonment.

According to the judgement, the convict, Manjoor Ahamed Chachi, has also been imposed a fine of Rs 1.5 lakh, and if he fails to pay this amount, he faces an additional six months of Rigorous Imprisonment. He was booked under Sections 20(b) (ii) (C) and 29 of the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances (NDPS) Act in February 2022.

The incident occurred on the morning of February 1, 2022, when police executed a special vehicle inspection at Churaibari Naka Point in North Tripura, along Assam border. During this operation, a truck going out of the state was stopped, and during the search, 260 kg of dry cannabis was recovered from a hidden chamber of the vehicle.

The truck's driver, identified as Manjoor Ahamed Chachi, was apprehended at the scene and charged under the NDPS Act. A comprehensive investigation led to the submission of a charge sheet on July 31, 2022. After a prolonged trial, the Additional Sessions Judge found the accused guilty and awarded punishment.

Tea sector sets target to formalise Rs 726 cr investment in Tripura Business Conclave

The tea industry in Tripura is set to receive proposed investments of Rs 726 crore from four private companies, demonstrating their interest in expanding operations within the state, said Chairman of the Tripura Tea Development Corporation (TTDC) Samir Ranjan Ghosh here on Wednesday.

The investment proposals are expected to be formalised through Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) at the Destination Tripura Business Conclave scheduled for July 9 and 10. It is anticipated that the proposed investments will lead to the creation of approximately 4,000 jobs, marking a significant milestone in Tripura's tea sector.

According to Ghosh, the companies expressing interest are Monoworld Recycling Private Limited, Itibachak Barta Foundation, Infidirect Tech Solutions Private Limited, and NDR Infrastructure Private Limited for the development of small tea grower clusters and various initiatives in research, skill development, digital technology adoption, branding, marketing, and tea tourism.

NDR Infrastructure plans to invest Rs 500 crore in developing integrated tea estates, MSME units, value-addition facilities, and an export facilitation hub. Monoworld Recycling intends to invest Rs 100 crore in advancements for the tea sector, while the Itibachak Barta Foundation has proposed an additional Rs 100 crore towards the modernisation of tea gardens and factories.

'Corrupt Punjab cop' at heart of US crackdown on Jaggu Bhagwanpuria syndicate

Federal indictments unsealed in Los Angeles as part of 'Operation Hard Ball' show how corruption at the local level in Punjab enabled global criminal enterprises to thrive across continents.

In a major revelation emerging from a sweeping international law enforcement operation by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) in the US, an alleged "corrupt Punjab police officer" has been directly implicated in fabricating murder charges and running extortion rackets on behalf of a ruthless India-based transnational crime syndicate.

According to federal indictments unsealed in Los Angeles as part of 'Operation Hard Ball', Gurinderjit Singh, a law enforcement officer in Punjab, worked hand-in-glove with members of the Jaggu Bhagwanpuria organised crime group to target perceived rivals with false accusations and demands for money. The



details, laid bare in US court documents, show how corruption at the local level in

Punjab enabled global criminal enterprises to thrive across continents. A US Department of Justice official made these revelations in a press statement in California late on July 7.

In April 2026, Gurlal Singh, a 22-year-old illegal immigrant from India living in Stockton, California, and an alleged member of the Bhagwanpuria syndicate, provided the name and details of a victim (identified in court papers as Victim 2) to Gurinderjit Singh, who is believed to be a police inspector posted as a station house officer in Punjab at the time.

Gurinderjit then allegedly contacted the victim's father and threatened to implicate the entire family, including the victim's sister, in the January 2026 murder of a man identified as "B.S.". As per the FBI, on April

13, 2026, Gurinderjit told the victim's father that charges would be filed against him for the murder.

On April 16, he allegedly demanded payment, warning that failure to pay would result in all three family members being named as accused. In May 2026, following a press conference in Punjab where Indian authorities publicly accused the family, Gurinderjit allegedly continued pressuring the victims for money, explicitly referencing instructions from Gurlal Singh and complaining that "they didn't pay us the whole amount what was agreed upon".

When contacted, Gurinderjit said he was aware of the development through social media but had not received any formal notice.

WB Baruipur rape-murder case: Prime accused killed in police firing during crime scene reconstruction; fourth suspect arrested

The investigation into the alleged gang rape and murder of 12-year-old girl in Baruipur took a dramatic turn in the early hours of Wednesday after the prime accused, Prabhas Mondal, was killed in police firing while allegedly attempting to escape during a crime scene reconstruction.

According to police, Mondal, the first person arrested in connection with the case, was taken to the crime scene at Suryapur around 12.45 am on Wednesday as part of the investigation.

Senior investigating officers and other policemen accompanied him to reconstruct the sequence of events.

Police claimed that during the exercise, Mondal allegedly snatched a firearm from police personnel and attempted to flee. Officers tried to restrain him, following which he allegedly opened fire at the police. The police then retaliated, critically injuring the accused. Mondal was immediately taken to Baruipur Sub-Divisional Hospital, where doctors declared him dead. Huge central forces surrounded the hospital to prevent any untoward incidents.

Police officials said the reconstruction was considered necessary as the accused had allegedly been giving misleading and inconsistent statements during interrogation and was not cooperating with investigators. The minor girl's body was recovered from a pond in the Suryapur area on Sunday morning.

Police suspect that she was sexually assaulted before being murdered. The incident triggered widespread outrage in the locality, with residents demanding the immediate arrest of those responsible and exemplary punishment for the culprits.

Consumer consent not required for installation of smart meters: Gujarat Electricity ombudsman

The Ombudsman upheld Madhya Gujarat Vij Company Limited's decision to replace a Vadodara businessman's existing meter & then disconnect supply over unpaid dues of Rs 235

CAN A power utility replace your electricity meter without your permission? As smart meters replace old meters in several parts of Gujarat, a Vadodara businessman's challenge has settled the question.

The Gujarat Electricity Ombudsman has upheld Madhya Gujarat Vij Company Limited's (MGVCL) decision to replace the consumer's existing meter and subsequently disconnect supply over unpaid dues of Rs 235.M D Patel, who runs a commercial establishment in Pratapnagar, challenged a May 12, 2026 order of the Consumer Grievances Redressal Forum (CGRF), Baroda City Circle, which

rejected his objections to the installation of a smart meter and the subsequent disconnection of his power supply. According to Patel's representation,



MGVCL "unilaterally, without prior specific written notice, safety warnings, or the explicit consent of the Appellant" replaced his working meter with a smart meter on December 18, 2025. He claimed this triggered a "system-side server

mismatch" that broke his bank auto-debit mandate – even though his other electricity connections on the same mandate continued functioning without a single default.

When his electricity supply was disconnected on March 27 this year, Patel argued, the MGVCL had failed to issue the mandatory 15-day individual notice required under Section 56(1) of the Electricity Act.

Patel pointed out that a routine bill footer "cannot legally take the place of" a statutory notice. He also alleged that MGVCL's silence on his RTI queries about the legal basis for mandatory smart meters amounted to an admission that no such mandate existed, and sought Rs 25,000 in compensation along with restoration of his old meter.

No let-up in rain in Surat, Navsari; hundreds displaced, 3 more dead

Three more people, including an 11-year-old, died in rain-related incidents in Surat and Navsari districts even as officials claimed that hundreds had been relocated as heavy rain continued to pounce these parts of Gujarat on Tuesday. Rishita Mistry, a 22-year-old woman, was struck by lightning when she was on the terrace of Sukun Apartments in Surat's Katargam. Even as an ambulance arrived for help, she was declared dead on the spot. "As per the neighbours, Rishita had gone to the terrace to get wet in the rain when she was struck by lightning," said

Katargam police inspector LR Gohil.

In another incident in Surat, 11-year-old Alina Shaikh was electrocuted when she was returning home in Mandarwaja, Salabatpura from a nearby madrasa. She was climbing the metal stairs of her house when she suffered an electric shock, police said, adding power officials inspected cable lines after the incident. Both their bodies were sent to the New Civil Hospital for post-mortem.

In Navsari district, one Walter Herman Topnu (25) was struck by lightning while trying to feed shrimp in a pond in Jalalpure, Maroli police sub-inspector V J Patel. A native of Jharkhand, Topnu was

employed to work at the shrimp pond and stayed nearby.

Meanwhile, officials said 270 people were relocated in Navsari alone and dozens of others in Surat. The downpour has crippled movement on several roads, including the main road connecting the two districts. City bus services had been halted.

On Tuesday, schools, colleges and several commercial establishments remained closed on account of severe waterlogging and rain. At several places, shopkeepers were seen moving their goods as water entered their shops in the commercial complexes.

Tensions within the Punjab Congress continued Tuesday as the dissident faction, primarily led by former chief minister Charanjit Singh Channi, maintained a distance from key organisational meetings convened by AICC General Secretary in-charge Bhupesh Baghel at the Punjab Congress headquarters.

Out of the three newly appointed working presidents, only two — Raj Kumar Verka and Sukhwinder Singh Danny — attended the meeting called by Baghel while Channi loyalist Sangat Singh Gilzian stayed away. There were also notable absentees from the meeting of the district presidents called by the Baghel, with at least five staying away, even as state Congress president Amrinder Singh Raja Warring tried to play down their absence.

The day started with Baghel holding a breakfast meeting with Verka, following which, the latter paid a visit to Channi. While Verka was tightlipped about what transpired at the meeting he emphasised that there were no differences between him and Channi.

"Elections are approaching, and we are preparing for it. If anyone wishes to express their views, they may do so; if anyone has a grievance against a specific individual or feels a decision was incorrect, they can voice their concerns to Baghel. If someone wants to speak directly to Rahul Gandhi, Mallikarjun Kharge, or KC Venugopal, they will be called there. I have met Channi. No one should harbor the

Speaking to media at the Congress office, Warring justified the absence of senior leaders of Channi group by saying that Channi had clarified the matter regarding his absence for a few days.

"There was a meeting of the chairpersons yesterday which was attended by Vijay Inder Singla and Dr Amar Singh, and Channi had informed everyone that he would be away for a day or two. He also spoke to Bhupesh Baghel yesterday, and when Bhupesh Baghel addressed the media in the evening, he clarified that Charanjit Singh Channi would be out for two days," said Warring.

Blighty blue in the face as Brexit begets Bregret

A decade has passed since the seismic morning of June 24, 2016, when the British electorate woke up to realise they had voted to sever their 43-year relationship with the European Union. Ten years on, the dust of that historic referendum has settled, leaving behind a stark landscape. What was promised as a triumphant reclamation of national sovereignty has instead evolved into a cautionary tale of economic friction and institutional exhaustion. A comprehensive look at Britain's post-Brexit decade reveals a nation grappling with self-inflicted wounds, a public reassessing its choices, and a continent that has fundamentally moved on.

To evaluate whether Brexit has done more harm than good is to look at a deeply asymmetric ledger of suffering and benefit. Economically, the verdict is overwhelmingly negative. Independent consensus indicates that the British economy is notably smaller than it would have been had it remained within the single market, hobbled by trade barriers, acute labour shortages and a persistent chilling effect on foreign investment. The primary sufferers have been the everyday British public: small-business owners buried under mountains of bureaucratic red tape, farmers stripped of agricultural subsidies and consumers bearing the brunt of inflation exacerbated by currency depreciation and import friction. Conversely, the beneficiaries form a remarkably narrow cohort. A small class of hedge fund managers and financial speculators successfully shorted the pound or profited from volatility. A few large conglomerates managed to absorb the regulatory compliance costs that crushed their smaller competitors. For the vast majority of the population, however, the promised upside of exiting the bloc never materialised. The foundational promises and grand claims made by the Leave campaign have been thoroughly exposed as either gross exaggerations or outright deceptions. The most infamous symbol of the campaign—a red bus promising to redirect £350 million a week from the EU to the National Health Service—stands as a monument to political fantasy. The NHS today faces deeper structural crises and longer waiting lists than at any point in its history, severely exacerbated by the loss of European medical staff.

The pledge that trade deals with the rest of the world, particularly a comprehensive pact with the US, would effortlessly replace European commerce has collapsed under geopolitical realities. Furthermore, the central emotional pillar of the Brexit campaign—reclaiming absolute control over national borders—has yielded a supreme irony: overall net migration to the UK actually hit record highs post-Brexit, merely shifting in composition from European workers to non-EU professionals and student dependents.

This stark divergence between promise and reality has triggered a profound shift in British public opinion. Polling data indicates that a clear majority of Britons (consistently around 57 percent) now view the decision to leave the EU as a historic mistake. The number of people who believe Brexit has been an outright failure is five times greater than those who deem it a success. A significant generational turnover has accelerated this shift, as young citizens who were too young to vote in 2016 overwhelmingly favour European integration. Yet, if a referendum to rejoin the EU were repolled tomorrow, its victory would be far from guaranteed. While a mathematical majority tells pollsters they wish to rejoin, that support plummets dramatically when confronted with the actual terms of modern re-entry. The British public remains fiercely opposed to accepting the euro, losing their historic budget opt-outs, or agreeing to the unrestricted free movement of people. Therefore, while 'Bregret' is a dominant cultural sentiment, it reflects a longing for a vanished past rather than a unified political will to endure the painful process of re-accession.

How do I prove my Indian citizenship

The exercise must be anchored in the maxim that the burden does not rest on the citizen

THE Ministry of External Affairs' assertion that the passport is not a "citizenship document" but a "travel document" has birthed a fundamental, unsettling question: if the passport is not proof of citizenship, what is? The vast apparatus of the Indian State dispenses benefits through myriad documents: ration card, health insurance enrolment, Kisan credit card and a host of similar instruments. These documents are, lock, stock and barrel, no proof of citizenship whatsoever. Then comes Aadhaar. Section 9 of the Aadhaar Act, 2016, states unequivocally that the Aadhaar number/card neither confers nor is evidence of citizenship. The driving licence fares no better. It is a permit issued under the Motor Vehicles Act to a person who is not otherwise disqualified, authorising them to drive a motor vehicle.

The Electoral Photo Identity Card (EPIC) sails in the same boat. Voting, a constitutional right, and not a fundamental right, is not an inalienable right available to every citizen by the mere fact of citizenship.

Furthermore, voter ID is issued not by the Central Government but by the Election Commission, whose plenary powers, broad as they may be under Article 324, do not extend to the determination of citizenship. This has been confirmed by the Supreme Court (SC) in the Special Intensive Revision (SIR) case — Association for Democratic Reforms v. ECI (2026). Having ruled out these tokens of identity, we return to the passport. The government's reliance on Section 20 of the Passports Act, 1967, which enables the issuance of a passport even to a non-citizen in public interest, suffers from the fallacy of composition. Besides, it draws strength from the Passport Manual (Chapter 2, Paragraph 6.1), which states that "a passport provides evidence of the holder's nationality, but this is placed in the same category as any other evidence of the citizenship status of an individual." This gives birth to two distinct and necessary lines of consideration. First, for all Indian nationals who hold a passport issued not under Section 20 but under the general rule of Section 5(2), the passport is an assertion of citizenship. Section 6 mandates the passport-issuing authority to reject an application for a passport inter alia on the ground that the applicant is a non-citizen. The entire inquiry and verification apparatus is predicated on the applicant being a citizen.

The machinery of citizenship across borders is also anchored to the passport as the operational certificate of citizenship. The Indian Community Welfare Fund

(ICWF), designed to assist overseas Indian nationals in times of distress and emergency on a means-tested basis, is explicitly reserved for "Indian citizens," not for Persons of Indian Origin or Overseas Citizens of India (OCI). The government's own consular machinery requires the production of an Indian passport to establish the beneficiary's citizenship, and an endorsement on that passport is mandatory for accessing the fund.

Furthermore, the architecture of the OCI, under Section 7A of the Citizenship Act, 1955, rests on this very edifice. An OCI cardholder, a former Indian citizen,



must prove one's own lineage of citizenship extending up to four generations to qualify. The primary, and often the only, document that establishes this former citizenship is a passport. In the same vein, children born abroad to Indian citizens are registered with Indian diplomatic missions to acquire citizenship by descent, and the parent's citizenship is proved by their Indian passport. At border trade posts like Tamu-Moreh in Manipur along the Myanmar border, interdependent communities of both nationalities traverse daily, depositing their IDs at the check-post in the morning and retrieving them upon return by sunset. Nationality is determined by these documents. Even Section 15 of the Immigration and Foreigners Act, 2025, states that when a foreigner in India with a valid passport is recognised as a national by the law of more than one foreign country, the civil authority may treat that foreigner as the national of the country on whose passport he entered India. Thus, a passport is the determinant of nationality.

Although the SC, in State Trading Corporation of India Ltd. v. Commercial Tax Officer (1963), held that 'citizenship' and 'nationality' are not interchangeable,

the judgment was made in the context that while juristic persons may be nationals for the purposes of international law, they cannot be citizens for the purposes of municipal law or the Constitution, which contemplates citizens as natural persons.

For natural persons, the conceptual distinction between nationality and citizenship, rooted in Roman law, has collapsed in the modern constitutional scheme. Roman law distinguished the nationals into civis (citizen with full political-civic rights), latinus (intermediate status), peregrinus (foreigner), servus (slave), and hostis (enemy) until all free subjects evolved into cives, leaving only foreigners and those stripped of citizenship outside the civic pale. An Indian national holding a passport issued under Section 5 (neither a slave, nor an enemy alien, nor a person deprived of citizenship) is a citizen simply because no other category exists to accommodate him. The second consideration flows from the Passport Manual: "any other evidence of the citizenship status". What document is such evidence?

Three successive questions provide the answer.

First, is the issue of the document preceded by such rigorous process that it effectively requires adducing all evidence of citizenship? The passport application requires a declaration of citizenship, verification of place and date of birth, and parentage. Second, are citizens fundamentally entitled, and prospective citizens eligible, to apply for that document? The right to travel abroad, a fundamental right under Article 21, as laid down in Maneka Gandhi v. Union of India (1978), is operationalised by the issuance of a passport.

A non-citizen, having no such fundamental right, may obtain a passport under Section 20, but the Section 5 route is a citizen's gateway. Third, is the issuing authority for a passport the Central Government and not any state government or any other instrumentality?

As things stand today, the standalone document that serves as practical proof of citizenship for a citizen by birth is a passport issued under Section 5. Certainly, it is not the only mode of proof but that is all a citizen has.

The ideal, of course, is a meticulously maintained National Register of Citizens (NRC), complemented by the National Population Register (NPR). Yet, the experience of Foreigners Tribunals and Illegal Migrants Determination Tribunals serves as a grim cautionary tale.

Any sincere citizenship determination exercise must be anchored in one unshakeable maxim: the burden to prove citizenship does not rest on the citizen; but the burden to rebut the presumption of citizenship rests on the State.

Roadside wrecks : Himachal HC rightly flags a civic hazard

Clearing accident-hit vehicles from public spaces is a basic administrative responsibility that protects lives

THE Himachal Pradesh High Court has done well to draw attention to an often-overlooked menace: accident-hit vehicles abandoned along public roads. The court's observations, prompted by damaged vehicles lying near the approach road to Shimla airport and around the Chakkar district courts, highlight the problem of wrecks being a threat to road safety, an environmental hazard and a glaring example of administrative neglect. In a hill state where roads are narrow, winding and vulnerable to landslides, every inch of the path matters. Abandoned vehicles reduce road width, obstruct visibility at sharp bends and hamper the movement of emergency services. They also create secondary accident risks, particularly during the monsoon, when slippery roads and poor visibility already test motorists. Public roads cannot be allowed to double up as scrapyards. The environmental cost is equally serious. Damaged vehicles often contain leaking fuel, engine oil, coolant, brake fluid and battery acid



that can contaminate soil and water bodies. In an ecologically fragile Himalayan region, such pollution carries long-term consequences. The problem persists because of poor coordination among the police, transport authorities, municipal bodies, insurance companies and the judiciary. Vehicles are not removed for long periods of time due to pending investigations, insurance disputes and the absence of designated storage facilities. The HC has rightly demanded a comprehensive action plan. Himachal needs dedicated impound yards, a digital inventory of seized vehicles, time-bound procedures for release and scientific recycling through scrapping centres. The Supreme Court, too, has repeatedly stressed that seized vehicles should not be left to rot indefinitely. Road safety is not only about enforcing traffic rules or improving infrastructure. Clearing accident-hit vehicles from public spaces is a basic administrative responsibility that protects lives.

Mookerjee, a lamp that still burns bright

The one ideal that defined Syama Prasad Mookerjee's public life above all else was the indivisibility of India

July 6 is a special day for countless people who cherish the ideals of nationalism and selfless service. We commemorate the 125th birth anniversary of Dr Syama Prasad Mookerjee, whose life remains a timeless example of courage and unwavering commitment to Maa Bharti. Few leaders in modern India embodied the seamless confluence of intellect, public service and moral conviction as profoundly as Mookerjee. The young Syama Prasad was born into circumstances that could have assured him a protected and comfortable life. His father, Sir Ashutosh Mookerjee, was among the foremost educationists of his age. Yet, his conscience led him towards a life of sacrifice and national service. He did not remain a mute spectator to the turbulence of his times, be it fighting colonialism, communalism or humanitarian challenges. Along this journey, he endured profound personal tragedies, including the loss of an infant child and, later, his wife. These tragedies only deepened his commitment to serve.

The one ideal that defined Syama Prasad Mookerjee's public life above all else was the indivisibility of India. He stood firm during the upheaval of the Partition to ensure that West Bengal remained an integral part of India. A few years later, that conviction drew him to Jammu and Kashmir. Imprisonment did not deter him and isolation did not diminish him. His life came to an abrupt end in detention, far from the countless people, whose cause he had made his own. There are moments in history when an individual's final sacrifice transcends politics and enters the realm of national memory. Mookerjee's last journey is one such moment. Acharya Vinoba Bhave said Mookerjee sacrificed himself for a cause in which he had faith. Years later, the revocation of Articles 370 and 35(A) in 2019 was a fitting tribute to

his martyrdom. Mookerjee put India first and Indian values first. And he did it by building institutions and nurturing systems that defied conventional mindsets of those times. He became the youngest Vice-Chancellor of the University of Calcutta. He brought positive changes that were patriotic and futuristic. Addressing a conference of educators, Mookerjee put it wonderfully when he said, "It is incorrect to look upon educational institutions as factories to produce potential clerks and low-paid staff. We have to turn out students who are capable of providing leadership to our self-governing institutions, such as municipal corporations, provincial and central legislatures, and also of directing the affairs in various fields of life such as financial, commercial and industrial ones."

Under his leadership, Calcutta University undertook efforts to improve library infrastructure, boost research in sciences, encourage the study of artefacts and establish courses in agriculture. He drew attention to sports, teacher training and student welfare. To instil a sense of pride among students and alumni, he began the practice of marking January 24 as the foundation day of the university. He requested Gurudev Rabindranath Tagore to compose a song for the university. Another example of this spirit can be seen in the later part of his life, when he decided to form the Bharatiya Jana Sangh. At a time when the Congress party was omnipresent, he felt that there was all the more reason for an alternative voice to speak up for India's progress while staying attached to our cultural roots. It was perhaps fitting that the party's symbol was the diya, the earthen lamp. A single lamp may appear modest, yet it possesses the power to dispel darkness far beyond itself. It is exactly what the Jana Sangh did, both during the years it was



active and beyond. Syama Prasad Mookerjee's tenure as India's first Minister for Industry and Supply reveals a statesman whose conception of development was remarkably comprehensive and humane. He viewed industry as a means of restoring dignity, opportunity and confidence to a newly independent nation. He respected wealth creation and value-addition. While laying the foundations of modern industrial India through pioneering initiatives, such as the Damodar Valley Corporation, the Sindri Fertiliser Plant and a robust industrial policy, he also ensured that India's traditional strengths were not neglected. Handlooms, cottage industries, artisans and textile workers found in him an equally committed champion.

Here, I would like to share a personal experience. The Sindri plant, which Mookerjee worked to establish with

a vision of self-reliance, was ignored by those who ran the nation for several decades. I feel honoured that our government had the opportunity to contribute to its revival. It was indeed among the most special moments to have been there for that programme.

India's civilisational tradition has long celebrated dialogue and discussions. Mookerjee embodied this democratic spirit. He joined Pandit Nehru's Cabinet, believing that the task of nation-building in the early years transcended political differences. He served with sincerity and a constructive spirit. But when he felt that questions of national importance demanded a different course, he relinquished office with dignity and devoted himself to the political work he believed the nation required. Pandit Nehru brought the First Amendment 75 years ago. It was a direct assault on free speech. Mookerjee was among its staunchest critics. He understood what the Congress was capable of doing. And he was proven right. Those who had brought the First Amendment imposed the Emergency in 1975, and 50 years ago, brought the 42nd Amendment Act, which again struck at the core of liberal democratic values.

Mookerjee also stood out for his humanitarian efforts. When the tragic famine struck Bengal in 1943, Mookerjee ensured that several canteens and relief centres were opened to feed people. On the one hand, he was deeply shaken by the plight of his people while on the other, he was repulsed by the insensitivity of the colonial rulers. He even wrote a book, 'Panchasher Manwantar', in which he expressed his angst. When a super cyclone hit Medinipur in 1942, his efforts to restore normalcy were lauded.

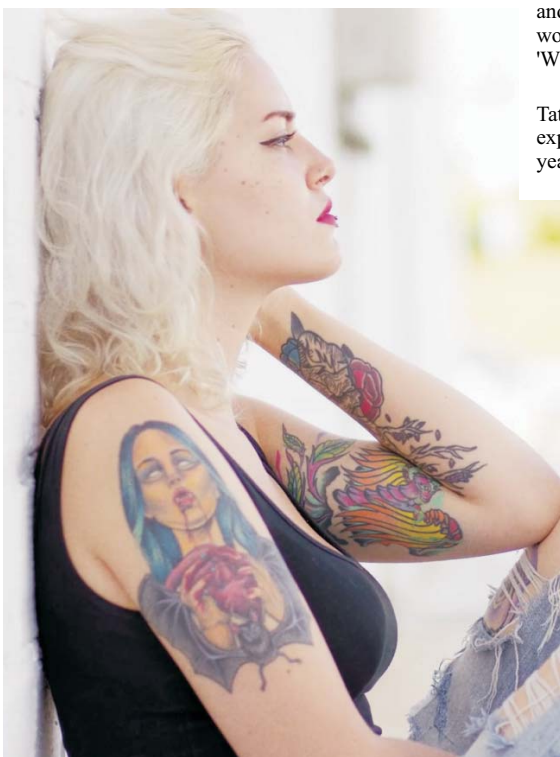

US gangs and Punjab cops: Why FBI wants SHO extradited as part of OP Hard Ball

US authorities have said they will seek the extradition of Gurinderjit Singh, the SHO of Tanda police station in Punjab's Hoshiarpur district, after charging him with allegedly extorting \$400,000 from a Los Angeles-based family by framing their relatives in India in a fake murder case.

New Delhi. (Agency)

Authorities in the US are preparing to seek the extradition of an Indian police officer serving as the station house officer (SHO) of the Tanda police station in Punjab's Hoshiarpur after he was charged with allegedly attempting to extort \$400,000 from a family in Los Angeles. The case forms part of Operation Hard Ball, an FBI-led international crackdown on "transnational organised crime groups" that has resulted in at least 24 arrests and 37 criminal charges across the US, Canada and Europe. According to federal indictments

unsealed in Los Angeles, Gurinderjit Singh, an SHO in Punjab, allegedly worked hand-in-glove with members of the Jaggu Bhagwanpuria transnational crime syndicate to target perceived rivals through false criminal complaints and extortion demands. Prosecutors allege Singh attempted to extort \$400,000 from a family in Los Angeles. Operation Hard Ball is the culmination of a years-long FBI investigation into criminal syndicates allegedly involved in murder, extortion, drug trafficking, firearms offences and other organised crime activities spanning multiple countries. According to US broadcaster



Fox 11, American authorities plan to formally seek the extradition of several accused currently in Indian custody, including gang leaders Lawrence Bishnoi and Jaggu Bhagwanpuria. In addition, US authorities are pursuing two other fugitives believed to be in India, one of

whom was identified by First Assistant US Attorney Bill Essayli as Gurinderjit Singh, the Los Angeles Times reported. **WHY DOES THE FBI WANT TO EXTRADITE A PUNJAB COP?** According to a seven-count federal indictment unsealed by the US Department of Justice titled United States v Bhagwanpuria, et al, members of the Jaggu Bhagwanpuria transnational crime syndicate allegedly collaborated with corrupt police officers in Punjab to carry out extortion schemes targeting victims in the US. The indictment, part of the FBI-led Operation Hard Ball targeting three

transnational organised crime groups, alleges that in April 2026, Gurlal Singh — an Indian national unlawfully present in the US and based in Stockton, California — threatened a victim in the United States and then shared the victim's identifying information with a corrupt Punjab police officer. Prosecutors claim the information was used to falsely implicate the victim, the victim's father, and the victim's sister in the January 2026 murder of an individual identified only as "BS" in court documents in India. The Punjab officer then allegedly leveraged the fabricated murder case to extort \$400,000 from the family in exchange for dropping.

Man chases mother's live-in partner down the street, stabs him to death

New Delhi. (Agency)

A man has been arrested for allegedly killing his mother's live-in partner by repeatedly stabbing him in Gujarat's Rajkot district. The incident took place on Tuesday, July 7, with multiple onlookers present. The killing was captured on a nearby CCTV camera. The victim has been identified as 35-year-old Kamlesh Vaghela. The accused, 20-year-old Jayant Vaghela, is the son of his live-in partner, Neeta. He was arrested within hours of a formal complaint being lodged by Kamlesh's younger brother, Kapil Vaghela (25). The video apparently shows the accused chasing the victim through an alley before getting hold of him and stabbing him multiple times with a sharp object. According to the police, Kamlesh and Neeta had been in a live-in relationship for the past 12 years. In his complaint, Kapil said that Jayant held a grudge against his brother over the fact that the live-in relationship began while his father was still alive. He alleged that this was the motivation behind the crime. The police said that Kamlesh arranged the marriage of Neeta's daughter during their relationship. The probe into the killing has revealed that he used to work as a labourer, an official said. Kamlesh suffered more than five stab wounds on different parts of his body in the fatal attack, the official added. The CCTV footage of the incident has gone viral on social media. In the clip, Kamlesh is supposedly heard pleading with bystanders to save his life. He is also heard requesting Jayant to spare him, saying, "I have not done anything to anyone."

Rain lashes Delhi after dry spell, IMD sounds red alert

New Delhi. (Agency)

After weeks of sweltering heat, rain lashed the capital on Tuesday afternoon, bringing respite to residents. Meanwhile, the India Meteorological Department has issued a 'red' alert for rain and strong winds across the city. Similar weather conditions are likely on July 8, with light thunderstorms, lightning and gusty winds expected in the afternoon. Earlier, the IMD had issued an 'orange' alert, warning of moderate rain at most places along with thunderstorms, lightning, but later upgraded it to 'red' for the city. The weather department had forecast moderate rain at many places and heavy rain at isolated places, accompanied by moderate thunderstorms and lightning, with wind speeds reaching up to 70 km/h. Meanwhile, the maximum temperature settled at around 37.2 degrees Celsius. The city recorded a minimum temperature of 30 degrees Celsius -- the highest since July 2, 2024, when the mercury settled at a low of 30.7 degrees Celsius. The IMD said the "feels like" temperature at 8.30 am was 44.7 degrees Celsius as relative humidity stood at 79%, making for uncomfortable weather. The Lodhi Road weather station recorded a minimum temperature of 30.4 degrees Celsius, Palam 28.3 degrees Celsius, Ayanagar 28.6 degrees Celsius and the Ridge 24.9 degrees Celsius. As heavy rain inundated many parts of the city, people witnessed waterlogging in many areas of Delhi NCR, like Noida and Gurugram. A large tree fell onto a moving Mercedes and another passing car on a busy road in southeast Delhi's East of Kailash on Tuesday afternoon. However, no injuries were reported, officials said. The Delhi Fire Services personnel said, "Three people were trapped inside a moving car after the tree crashed onto the road. All of them were safely rescued, and no one was injured". They stressed the need for regular pruning and periodic health assessment of trees in the area.

Fake profiles, marriage promises: Government warns of rising matrimonial fraud

The Ministry of Home Affairs' Indian Cyber Crime Coordination Centre (I4C) has warned people against a sharp rise in online matrimonial frauds, saying cybercriminals are exploiting matrimonial websites and apps by posing as wealthy professionals or NRIs, gaining victims' trust with promises of marriage and then duping them of large sums of money.

money on various pretexts, including customs charges for gifts, travel expenses, visa fees or medical emergencies. According to the agency, the fraud typically follows a predictable pattern. The accused

first create attractive fake profiles with fabricated credentials and photographs to impress prospective partners. After establishing trust over days or weeks of conversations, they express a desire to marry before introducing financial requests. The advisory noted that many victims transfer money believing they are helping their prospective partner. Once the payment is made, the fraudsters either disappear or continue demanding additional funds using new excuses. The agency also outlined measures users can take to protect themselves and flagged several warning signs that should not be ignored while interacting on matrimonial platforms.

Supreme Court Questions Centre Over Blanket Ban On Pregnant IPS Officers During Probation Training

New Delhi. (Agency)

The Supreme Court on Wednesday questioned the Centre over a 1993 government policy that bars pregnant Indian Police Service (IPS) probationers from undergoing training, observing that a beneficiary provision introduced for women cannot be used to deny them opportunities if they are medically fit. Hearing a petition filed by IPS officer Urvashi Sengar, the court sought the Centre's response by Thursday and asked it to clarify whether she could

be permitted to join the Phase-II training programme, which commenced in June this year.



"This is a beneficiary provision under law for protection of women and not to take away the right to undergo training if they are fit for it," the

bench observed while examining the validity of the Ministry of Home Affairs' 1993 Office Memorandum (OM). The court further asked the Centre, "When the purpose of this OM is to enable training of a fit woman, then why are you stopping her if she is fit?" The bench also observed that a blanket rule may not be appropriate, noting that while some women may be fit to resume training within nine months of childbirth, others may require much longer. It indicated that such cases should be assessed individually rather than through a rigid policy.

Delhi HC denies bail to alleged Indian Mujahideen operative in 2008 blasts case

New Delhi. (Agency)

The Delhi High Court on Tuesday denied bail to alleged Indian Mujahideen operative and head of its media cell, Mansoor Asghar Peerbhoy, in the 2008 Delhi serial blasts case, holding that national security takes precedence over personal liberty. A bench of justices Prathiba M Singh and Madhu Jain noted that Peerbhoy played a central role in transmitting an email titled 'Message of Death' just minutes before the blasts, claiming responsibility for the attack. The court was hearing an appeal against a trial court order dated July 19, 2025, denying him bail. The serial blasts in Delhi on September 13, 2008 took 26 lives and injured more than 100 people. "Such a level of coordination, planning and logistics was possible only through the deployment of skilled technology, and the appellant was, prima facie, at the centre of it," the bench said. Rejecting the accused's argument that he had spent 17 years in jail as an undertrial prisoner, the bench said, "For such brazen and blatant acts of terrorism, for which the appellant has been charged, the allegations against the appellant pertain to offences of the gravest nature, for which the law prescribes severe punishments, extending even to the death penalty in appropriate cases." Therefore, the bench asserted on the matter of bail, "...the long period of incarceration, in the opinion of the court, would not by itself be sufficient to grant bail to the appellant," the bench said. According to the prosecution, Peerbhoy, a software engineer, was a key member of the banned Indian Mujahideen, whose primary role was not in planting the bombs but in providing technological support to the conspiracy. Minutes before the explosions, he allegedly drafted and sent emails to media organisations claiming responsibility for the blasts.

Congress occupied 24 Akbar Road headquarters without authorisation since 2013: RTI

The RTI reply, furnished by the Directorate of Estates, which falls under the Union Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, states that Bungalow No. 24, Akbar Road was allotted to the Congress party on August 7, 1992. However, its allotment was cancelled with effect from June 26, 2013.

The Congress party has remained in "unauthorised occupation" of its former headquarters at 24, Akbar Road since June 26, 2013, and the government has not received any rent for the bungalow during this period, according to a Right to Information (RTI) reply accessed by India Today. The Centre has also said that the party's outstanding dues are "under review and yet to be determined." The RTI reply, furnished by the Directorate of Estates, which falls under the Union Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs, states that Bungalow No. 24, Akbar Road, located in Lutyens'

Delhi, was allotted to the Congress party. party on August 7, 1992. However, its allotment was cancelled with effect from June 26, 2013, and the bungalow has remained under the party's unauthorised occupation ever since, according to the government. **NO RENT RECEIVED SINCE 2013** In its response to the RTI application, the Directorate of Estates said no rent has been received for 24, Akbar Road since June 26, 2013. It added that the outstanding dues of the Congress are under review and yet to be determined, indicating that the government is yet to assess the amount recoverable from the

maintained in a compiled form and that compiling them would disproportionately divert the resources of the public authority under Section 7(9) of the RTI Act. The latest disclosure assumes significance in light of an earlier RTI reply accessed by India Today in 2018, in which the Directorate of Estates had said the licence fee for 24, Akbar Road had been revised to Rs 3,920 per month with effect from July 1, 2017. That reply had also enclosed the 2013 cancellation letter issued to the Congress and noted that the party's request for retention of the bungalow and charging of the normal licence fee was under consideration.



Stock markets climb in early trade on foreign fund inflows

On a remarkable Tuesday evening that belonged entirely to the resilience of two 39-year-old athletes, Novak Djokovic and Lionel Messi provided the sporting world with twin masterclasses in longevity. Hours after Messi galvanised Argentina to a dramatic 3-2 comeback victory over Egypt in the FIFA World Cup Round of 16 in Atlanta, Djokovic's response: "It would be nice to play 90 minutes like him." On the surface, it was a classic piece of Djokovic wit, delivered with the easy charm of a man who had just booked his place in yet another semi-final. RBI backs crypto ban again, tax department cites tracking and tax risks: Report

New Delhi. (Agency)

India's cryptocurrency policy remains uncertain, but internal government documents show that key authorities continue to favour tighter restrictions on digital assets. The Reserve Bank of India (RBI) has once again backed a policy that leans towards banning cryptocurrencies, while the Income Tax Department has raised concerns that trading through overseas exchanges is difficult to monitor, according to the documents reviewed by Reuters. The document suggests that although the government has not yet decided whether to regulate or ban cryptocurrencies, important agencies remain worried about the risks linked to virtual digital assets.

RBI WANTS STRONGER RESTRICTIONS

The RBI has repeated its long-standing view that India's crypto policy should be "leaning towards prohibition". According to documents from May and June, the central bank believes banks and other financial institutions should not be allowed to hold, trade or have exposure to cryptocurrencies or privately issued stablecoins. It believes such steps would reduce the risk of problems spreading. A source familiar with the RBI's thinking told Reuters that the central bank prefers keeping cryptocurrencies outside the regulated financial system. The source spoke on the condition of anonymity as they were not authorised to speak publicly to the wider financial system. Although there is currently no rule stopping Indian banks from dealing in cryptocurrencies, most major lenders have stayed away from the sector following repeated warnings from the RBI.

WHAT ARE DARK PATTERNS?

Dark patterns are digital design techniques that influence consumers into making choices that benefit the

company rather than the user. These could include automatically adding products to a shopping cart, making subscription



cancellations deliberately complicated, displaying misleading discounts, hiding charges until the final payment page or repeatedly nudging users with messages suggesting that an offer is about to expire. While many consumers experience these tactics regularly,

most do not realise there is a formal term for them—or that regulators are increasingly viewing them as deceptive business practices. The Central Consumer Protection Authority (CCPA) first issued guidelines against dark patterns in 2023. More recently, Sebi proposed a Common Advertisement Code (CAC) for entities it regulates, specifically banning the use of dark patterns in financial advertisements and investor communications.

ITR filing alert: 7 tax rules every intraday and F&O trader should know

Buying and selling shares has become easier than ever. Many people now actively trade in stocks, while others try their hand at intraday trading or futures and options (F&O) to earn extra income. But when it comes to filing income tax returns, trading income is treated very differently from normal investment gains.

For Assessment Year (AY) 2026-27, traders need to be more careful than before. The Income Tax Department has introduced additional disclosure requirements in the latest ITR forms, especially for those earning

through intraday and F&O trading. Filing the wrong return or reporting income incorrectly could lead to notices, delays or unnecessary compliance issues later. Here are seven important tax rules every intraday and F&O trader should know before filing their income tax return.

PICKING THE RIGHT ITR FORM IS THE FIRST STEP

One of the biggest mistakes traders make is selecting the wrong ITR form. If you earn income from intraday trading or F&O transactions, you will generally have to file ITR-3. This is because the Income Tax Department treats intraday trading as speculative

business income, while income from F&O trading is considered non-speculative business income.

ITR-2 is meant for taxpayers who only have capital gains from investments, while ITR-1 is available only for taxpayers meeting specific eligibility conditions. Choosing the wrong form can delay processing of your return and may invite further queries from the tax department.

UNDERSTAND HOW YOUR TRADING INCOME IS CLASSIFIED

Not every stock market transaction is taxed in the same way. If you buy shares and sell them later as an investment, the profit is normally taxed under capital gains.

WHY ARE GOLD PRICES UNDER PRESSURE?

Market sentiment weakened after reports of fresh strikes by both the US and Iran raised fears of another escalation in the Middle East. The conflict has once again brought attention to the possibility of disruptions in the region's oil supplies. As crude oil prices climbed, concerns over inflation returned. Higher oil prices often feed into overall inflation, which can prompt central banks to

keep interest rates elevated for longer. That has made investors rethink their bets on gold. At the same time, the US dollar has strengthened, making gold more expensive for overseas buyers and limiting demand.

INFLATION FEARS ARE OUTWEIGHING GOLD'S SAFE-HAVEN APPEAL

According to Dr Renisha Chainani, Head - Research at Augmont, the recent geopolitical developments have changed market expectations around inflation and interest rates.

"Gold and silver are trading on a weaker footing, as worries about inflation and higher interest rates resurfaced after fresh US strikes on Iran pushed oil prices and the dollar higher, just ahead of the Fed's June meeting minutes. This fresh flare-up put the interim US-Iran peace deal at risk and sent oil prices climbing, reviving inflation concerns and boosting the case for another rate hike," Chainani said. She added that investors were also waiting for more clarity from the US Federal Reserve.

"Investors were also waiting on the minutes from the Fed's June 16-17 meeting, due later today, for fresh clues on where interest rates are headed under Chair Kevin Warsh. Markets have now pushed up the odds of a September rate hike to over 63%, up from around 57% just a day earlier," Chainani said. The expectation of higher interest rates has reduced gold's appeal in the short term, despite rising geopolitical tensions.

Surat man murders father with kitchen knife; arrested

Drug peddler arrested, 18 weapons, 771gm ganja seized in Bengaluru

A drug peddler was arrested by Byatarayanapura police for allegedly attempting to sell weapons, including machetes, near Satellite Bus Station on Mysuru Road on July 1. The police seized 18 weapons, 771 grams of ganja and 237 mobile phones from him. Preliminary investigations revealed that he used to take mobile phones from those not paying him for drugs purchased from him. The accused has been identified as autorickshaw driver Akbar Sharif, 37, a resident of Shyamanna Garden. Six cases have been registered against him, including four under the NDPS Act. He was taken into custody and booked under the Arms Act. Sharif allegedly confessed that he sold ganja. He also said whenever customers did not have cash to buy ganja, he took their mobile phones. Based on information provided by Sharif, the team conducted a raid on July 3 and recovered the weapons kept near his house. The team also seized 771 grams of ganja and 237 mobile phones valued at Rs 15 lakh from him. A senior police officer said investigations are on to ascertain to whom the accused was supplying weapons.

Following the collapse of a house at the New Mandli Extension, MLA Channabasappa visited the spot and reviewed the situation. He listened to the grievances of the affected family and directed officials to take immediate measures to disburse relief to flood victims. "Complete all legal procedures and ensure that the family receives maximum relief from the government," he told officials. Swollen rivers raise water levels in reservoirs The water level in Tunga reservoir on Tuesday reached 588.25 metres, nearing the reservoir's maximum capacity. The water level in the Bhadra reservoir also rose to 140.6 feet against the maximum capacity of 186 feet. Dahod, Narmada, Surat, Tapi and Chhota Udepur, Amreli and Jitu Vaghani, virtually reviewed the Bhavnagar were put on yellow alert for preparations in Amreli, Rajkot and Bhavnagar with district officials there, on heavy rain. Doctor falls for fake advertisement, duped of Rs 86 lakh in Hyderabad

HYDERABAD.(Agency)

Cyber fraudsters allegedly cheated a 76-year-old doctor of Rs 86 lakh by impersonating representatives of an investment platform and misusing the name and image of Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman in a fraudulent social media advertisement. According to the complaint, the doctor came across an online advertisement on March 9 claiming investors could earn Rs 22 lakh a week. The next day, he received a WhatsApp call from a man identifying himself as 'Ashwin', who claimed to represent a company called Social Venture Capital and persuaded him to register by paying Rs 17,500 and opening a Demata account. The victim subsequently invested Rs 5 lakh initially and later transferred larger sums after being promised high returns. When he attempted to withdraw Rs 85 lakh, the money was allegedly diverted to another account. The fraudsters then demanded additional payments towards bank and processing charges on multiple occasions. Realising he had been cheated, the doctor approached the Hyderabad cyber crime police, who registered a case and launched an investigation.

2 Mumbai lakes are overflowing: Should you worry about flooding? Vihar and Tulsi lakes have begun overflowing after heavy rain in Mumbai. Here's what it means for flood risks, water supply and the ongoing water cut.

Mumbai.(Agency)

Vihar and Tulsi, two of Mumbai's smallest potable water-supplying lakes, filled on Tuesday night following heavy, relentless downpours and have begun overflowing. Vihar Lake hit 100 per cent capacity and started spilling over at 9 pm on Tuesday, followed shortly by Tulsi Lake, which began overflowing at 11.43 pm. Both reservoirs are located within the dense foliage of the Sanjay Gandhi National Park (SGNP) and are part of the seven-lake network that meets Mumbai's daily drinking water demands. Tulsi is Mumbai's smallest lake reservoir, with a total holding capacity of 8,046 million litres. Vihar is the second-smallest, with a

storage capacity of 27,698 million litres, supplying 90 million litres of water to the city every day. Commissioned in 1860, Vihar is the oldest man-made reservoir in the city, its origin coinciding with the historical growth of the erstwhile Bombay city. Tulsi Lake's water was formally channelled into the city by the then-Governor, Sir Richard Temple Bart, on March 15, 1879. Why overflow means continuous monitoring The overflow from both Tulsi and Vihar lakes drains directly into the Mithi River, which cuts through the heart of Mumbai before emptying into the Arabian Sea. For city administrators, the overflow from these twin reservoirs

underscores the need to monitor the Mithi River's water levels, especially if heavy rains persist. "The overflow of Vihar Lake goes into the



Mithi River. We will now be closely monitoring the situation," Mumbai Municipal Commissioner Ashwini Bhide

said Wednesday. For the average citizen, there is no immediate cause for alarm, but those living in low-lying areas near the Mithi River should remain vigilant. The concern stems from recent history. Heavy, incessant downpours between August 18 and 19 last year caused Vihar Lake to overflow intensely, pushing the Mithi River near its dangerous 4.2-metre breach mark. The resulting surge caused the Mithi and an adjacent major storm drain to overflow onto city streets, inundating low-lying areas near the airport lands in Kurla. In a preemptive move, the BMC and the Mumbai Police evacuated more than 350 residents from the area.

Archer fires subtle dig at IPL over easy pitches: Back to normal in England

England fast bowler Jofra Archer said bowling in English conditions feels like a return to "normal" after spending months adapting to the "easy wickets and smaller boundaries" in India, particularly during the IPL. Archer made the remarks after starring in England's crushing 125-run win over India in the third T20I at Trent Bridge on Tuesday. The right-arm quick returned figures of 3 for 29, while Josh Tongue claimed 4 for 38 as India were bundled out for just 76 in 11.4 overs while chasing 202, their biggest defeat by runs in T20I history. When asked whether facing Indian batters in England required a different approach after competing against many of them in the IPL, Archer said the conditions allowed bowlers greater room for error.



"I think it goes back to normal here," Archer said at the post-match press conference. "You try to bowl the ball straight on a good length. Whereas over there, because the wickets are so easy and the boundaries are so small, you have to be really, really particular. Here, I feel your margin for error is a little bit bigger."

200 ISN'T ALWAYS SAFE IN IPL

Archer also highlighted the contrast between English conditions and the IPL, saying England's total of 201 was always going to be difficult to chase at Trent Bridge. "At the IPL, sometimes 200 isn't safe. With 200 on the board on that wicket, I don't want to say we were confident, but I felt it would have taken a really special innings to chase it down," he said.

Yet, beneath the humour lies a fascinating dual interpretation that captures the distinct realities of modern elite sport. To take Djokovic literally is to understand the sheer physical toll of modern baseline tennis. After five hours of brutal

lateral movement on a fading Centre Court grass, the concept of a definitive 90-minute whistle must feel like an



absolute luxury. In football, the clock is an absolute boundary; in Grand Slam tennis, the boundary is only found when one man breaks. Djokovic's quack was a nod to the gruelling, open-ended nature of his craft, where a single match can demand the physical output of three consecutive football fixtures.

However, there is a deeper tactical appreciation embedded in his words. To

play 90 minutes like Messi is not merely about duration; it is about sustained, calculated intensity. Messi's genius at 39 relies on the economy of movement—walking for periods to read the pitch before exploding into pockets of space with devastating precision.

For Djokovic, an athlete whose entire defensive mastery is built on perpetual movement and kinetic coverage, the ability to govern a game with such quiet, bursts of high-intensity authority is the ultimate sporting triumph. The triumphs in Atlanta and London were a poetic reminder of what remains when peak youth fades. Messi, facing an organised Egyptian side that threatened a historic upset, relied on pure footballing intellect and leadership to orchestrate Argentina's escape. The defending champions eventually beat Egypt 3-2 to secure their passage into the quarterfinals, thanks to Messi's assist and goal.

Two 39-year-olds, Messi and Djokovic, prove it's never over till it's over

"These are the kind of moments that I still play tennis for, for sure," said Novak Djokovic, barely able to stand on his own legs. He had just played five hours and fifteen minutes, the longest quarter-final in Wimbledon history, against an opponent 14 years his junior. Meanwhile, he is 39 years and 44 days old and won it in a fifth-set tie-break. His opponent, World No. 4 Felix Auger-Aliassime, was one of us by the time he reached the net. A fanboy, shaking his head, still not able to comprehend what the old man had conjured on a Centre Court that has staged more than its share of such moments. This was London, close to



midnight. A few hours earlier in Atlanta, USA, a footballer had offered his own lesson in refusing to give up. Lionel Messi. Another 39-year-old. He had inspired a comeback that looked, for long stretches, entirely improbable, as Argentina beat Egypt in the Round of 16 of the FIFA World Cup.

"These are the kind of moments that I still play tennis for, for sure," Djokovic said. "These are the kind of moments that I still play football for, for sure." Messi And these were the moments that kept fans up on a Tuesday evening, watching two champions who have nothing left to prove put their bodies on the line anyway, absorbing the agony of pressure just to pull off the improbable one more time.

Egypt coach Hossam Hassan booked after anti-racism gesture in World Cup loss to Argentina

Egypt coach Hossam Hassan was shown a yellow card after making FIFA's anti-racism gesture during his side's dramatic 3-2 defeat to Argentina in the FIFA World Cup Round of 16 on Tuesday. Hassan's actions came during a chaotic closing phase at Atlanta Stadium, where Egypt surrendered a 2-0 lead as Lionel Messi-inspired Argentina fought back to reach the quarter-finals and keep alive their bid to retain the World Cup title.

With emotions running high, several Egyptian players and members of the coaching staff were booked by French referee Francois Letexier. One member of the Egypt bench was also sent off in second-half stoppage time as tempers

flared following a contentious VAR decision that ruled out what would have been Egypt's second goal. Amid the protests, Hassan stood in front of Letexier and crossed his arms to form



an "X" symbol, the gesture introduced by FIFA as part of its universal anti-racism protocol. Under the guidelines, players, coaches or team officials can use the signal to alert the referee to alleged racist abuse during a match.

If acknowledged, the referee can

activate FIFA's three-step procedure, which begins with temporarily stopping play. If the abuse continues, the match can be suspended and, in extreme cases, abandoned. Instead,

Letexier showed Hassan a yellow card and play continued. Neither FIFA nor the match officials immediately explained why the Egypt coach was cautioned.

The controversy added to Egypt's frustration over a pivotal VAR intervention earlier in the second half.

Mostka Ziko appeared to have doubled Egypt's lead after combining brilliantly with Mohamed Salah, only for the goal to be overturned after Letexier reviewed an earlier incident and ruled that Argentina defender Lisandro Martinez had been fouled in the build-up.

Switzerland beat Colombia on penalties to reach first quarter-final since 1954

Switzerland ended a 72-year wait for a place in the World Cup quarter-finals after beating Colombia 4-3 on penalties following a goalless 120 minutes in Vancouver on Tuesday, with Ruben Vargas converting the decisive spot-kick to set up a last-eight clash against defending champions Argentina. Gregor Kobel emerged as Switzerland's hero in the shoot-out, saving Cucho Hernandez's penalty after Davinson Sanchez had earlier struck the crossbar. Although Manuel Akanji blazed his effort over the bar to briefly hand Colombia hope, Vargas kept his



composure to send the Swiss into their first World Cup quart

The victory was all the more remarkable given the circumstances. Murat Yakin's side were without breakout star Johan Manzambi through injury, had Vargas carrying a knock and managed just two shots on target across 120 minutes. Yet they found a way to survive against a

Is FIFA favouring Argentina? Egypt coach's rigged World Cup charge divides opinion

FIFA World Cup 2026: Egypt coach Hossam Hassan accused officials of rigging his side's dramatic 2-3 defeat to Argentina after the defending champions staged a stunning late comeback in Atlanta. His allegations drew contrasting reactions from Thierry Henry, Roy Keane and Zlatan Ibrahimovic, reigniting the debate over VAR consistency and refereeing standards.

Egypt's dramatic 3-2 defeat to Argentina in the FIFA World Cup Round of 16 has sparked a fierce debate over refereeing standards and VAR, after coach Hossam Hassan claimed his side had been "cheated" and alleged the tournament was being tilted in favour of the defending champions. Hassan launched a scathing attack on the officials after Egypt squandered a two-goal lead in the closing stages in Atlanta, describing the contest as "clearly a rigged match" and suggesting external forces had influenced the outcome. "I do not want to put it nicely and talk about hard luck. We have been cheated unfairly today, we

have suffered injustice," Hassan said in his post-match press conference. "I will say what's on my mind regardless of the



consequence. This was clearly a rigged match, and the whole world saw it." And I want to say one more thing. If they want

Argentina to win so badly, why call everyone to come and participate?" Hassan repeated those allegations in a separate interview with BeIN Sports, claiming the officials had come under pressure to keep Lionel Messi and the reigning champions alive in the tournament. Perhaps they wanted to keep the world champions in the competition. Perhaps they wanted Messi to stay in the running," Hassan said.

"In football, there are sometimes external factors that go beyond the technical aspects. The world champions received support at every level."

Egg freezing, or oocyte cryopreservation, is a medical procedure in which a woman's eggs are collected, frozen and stored for future use. Many women choose to freeze their eggs to preserve fertility and keep the option of having biological children later in life.

About Mimi

Released in 2021 and directed by Laxman Utekar, *Mimi* follows the story of a young aspiring actor who agrees to become a surrogate mother for an American couple in exchange for money to fulfil her dreams. However, her life takes an unexpected turn when the couple decides not to take the baby after learning about a possible medical complication during the pregnancy. Tehran targets Bahrain, Kuwait after US strikes and limits Iran's oil sales over ship attacks

The U.S. military attacked Iran early Wednesday after it said Tehran struck three ships in the Strait of Hormuz, part of an American effort that also revoked the Islamic Republic's ability to openly sell crude oil in the world market. Iran retaliated with strikes targeting Bahrain and Kuwait.The regional crossfire raised the risks that an interim agreement to halt fighting in the war could break down, putting the Middle East again at risk of a wider conflict.The attacks on shipping and the resulting strikes came during the dayslong funeral for Iran's Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, who was killed Feb. 28 in the war's first moments at age 86. The funeral, which ends Thursday, had been thought to be a period of lower tensions — though mourners have repeatedly called for the killings of U.S. President Donald Trump and Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu.Negotiations to reach a final deal had been due to start after Khamenei's burial and focus on the toughest matters, including fully reopening the strait and rolling back Tehran's disputed nuclear program. But the new attacks threw that into question."The era of bullying and extortion is over," Iran's Parliament Speaker Mohammad Bagher Qalibaf wrote on X. "It leads nowhere. We don't fold."

Rescuers search for missing in China storms after 100,000 evacuated

Rescuers scoured flooded parts of China for survivors after devastating storms killed 17 people, caused dozens of rivers to overflow and a reservoir dam to burst, with officials warning rain will persist on Wednesday.Six people died and at least 130,000 people were evacuated in the southern region of Guangxi after torrential rain and severe flooding from Typhoon Maysak, regional officials said, warning rain would persist there and in neighbouring Guangdong province on Wednesday.Fast-flowing muddy water burst the banks of 40 rivers and waterways in Guangxi, damaging nearly 13,000 acres of agricultural land, state media reported.Videos published by state broadcaster CCTV showed torrents of water rushing past the crumbled concrete walls of a reservoir dam that had burst in Guangxi, while rescue workers wearing life vests were deployed on inflatable boats.Chinese authorities were sending additional disaster relief like food, raincoats, and rubber boats to the region, state news agency Xinhua reported on Wednesday.

US immigration officer shoot and kill Mexican man in Houston during an enforcement operation

A US Immigration and Customs Enforcement officer shot and killed a man in Houston after he attempted to evade arrest in his vehicle during an operation Tuesday, the agency said. The Department of Homeland Security said in a statement that the man, a Mexican national, ignored commands to stop and attempted to ram an agent who fired his weapon in self-defense. The man was targeted in an operation because he was living in the country without legal permission, according to the department, which oversees ICE. The man's car struck an ICE vehicle, the department added. The death drew immediate calls from some Democratic officials and immigrant rights groups for an independent investigation. Democratic US Rep. Sylvia Garcia, who represents the neighborhood where the shooting took place, said the initial account released by federal authorities needs to be independently verified."All available footage, communications, and other evidence should be preserved and reviewed as part of a full and impartial investigation," she said in a post oThe DHS statement identified the man as Lorenzo Salgado Araujo and said he died at a hospital. The FBI's Houston field office is investigating a potential assault on a federal law enforcement officer, said spokesperson Connor Hagan. In addition, representatives of the office's evidence response team responded to the shooting at the request of DHS to process the scene, he said.n X.

What to know about the electronic monitor a French court says Marine Le Pen must wear

A French court ordered far-right leader Marine Le Pen to wear an electronic monitor after convicting her of embezzlement, reflecting France's common use of such devices to reduce prison overcrowding.

Electronic monitors such as one that Marine Le Pen may have to wear when she campaigns to succeed French President Emmanuel Macron in elections next year are a common measure in France, in part o ease prison overcrowding.A Paris appeals court on

Tuesday declared the far-right leader guilty of embezzlement and ordered her subjected to electronic monitoring as part of her punishment.Still, Le Pen said she'll run for the French presidency next year despite that verdict — something that is possible under French law. She said she doesn't expect to wear an electronic bracelet at all, because she believes France's highest court will ultimately vindicate her on appeal.That court, the Court of Cassation, previously said it would be able to rule before the presidential election, and Le Pen could eventually be forced to wear the monitor during the campaign if her apael proved unsuccessful.Here's what to know about electronic monitors:French prisons are overcrowded and have



struggled with worsening detention conditions, according to the European Committee for the Prevention of Torture. Electronic monitors keep from adding to that problem.Under French law, home detention requires a person to wear an electronic ankle monitor or bracelet and prohibits them from leaving their home or another designated location of residence, except during the hours authorized by

the judge.The designated location and the periods during which the person must remain there are determined by the court or by the judge responsible for the enforcement of sentences.Such a device makes it difficult to conduct a political campaign but not impossible.If Le Pen's conviction is eventually upheld, a specialized judge will decide how her electronic monitoring will be carried out, the residence where she must serve the sentence and the hours she will be permitted to leave.The law provides that "during the period of sentence adjustment, the convicted person may be eligible for sentence reductions of up to six months per year," and even conditional release, the appeals court stressed in a statement.

we are sovereign states and we need everybody to respect our territorial integrity and our sovereignty."Trump reopened old wounds over Greenland on the eve of the meeting by insisting that the United States should control the semiautonomous island. NATO is founded on the principle that its 32 members will defend each others' territory, not threaten to seize it.Fredeiksen said Denmark is "ready to defend every inch of NATO including our own territory" in the event of an attack, and would rely on NATO allies to honor their

commitment to defend each other. Taiwan warns China 'expansionism' to persist without global action

China's "authoritarian expansionism" in regional waters will persist if the world fails to act, a senior Taiwanese security official warned on Wednesday, describing Beijing's strategy as "incremental salami slicing".Chinese ships regularly ply the East China Sea, Taiwan Strait and the South China Sea to assert Beijing's maritime claims over disputed waters and islands.China is "constantly pushing the limits through an incremental salami-slicing approach," Lii Wen, a deputy secretary-general of the National Security Council, told an international forum. Lii said China's "authoritarian expansionism" involved the use of military, coast guard, research and maritime militia vessels to press its claims and attempt to "transform international waterways into internal waters"."If the world fails to voice our concerns or take action, this expansionism will only continue," Lii warned.Ocean Affairs Minister Kuan Bi-ling told the forum that Taiwan, Japan and the Philippines faced the "same pattern of actions" that were "deliberately controlled to remain below the threshold of conventional warfare"."When a series of actions accumulates, it may create an entirely new status quo," Kuan said.

Kuan said international partners needed to have "shared understanding of the status quo" and prepare coordinated response measures "before the next crisis occurs".Their remarks came a day after ships from Japan's and China's coast guards faced off near disputed islands claimed as the Senkaku in Japan and the Diaoyu in China.Each side claimed they drove out the other's vessels that had intruded into their territorial waters.Last month, China started patrolling waters to the east of Taiwan for the first time following talks between Japan and the Philippines to draw a boundary in that area, which Beijing called "illegal".

China claims Taiwan is part of its territory and also asserts that waters around the island democracy come under its jurisdiction, which Taipei rejects.Ocean Affairs Deputy Minister Sung Chen-en said he would ensure China's patrol was not "permanent", noting the affected waters were "within our exclusive economic zone".

"They don't have rights here, no matter what are their excuses," Sung told AFP on the sidelines of the forum.

The Boeing 737 was being operated by Karachi-based K2 Airways on a cargo flight from Sharjah in the UAE to Karachi when it reported a navigation system problem at 9:18 p.m. local time, the authority said.Radar data showed th aircraft rapidly descending and making a sharp change in heading at about 9:21 p.m. before radar and radio contact were lost about 155 nautical miles (287 kilometres, 178 miles) west of Karachi, the authority said. Authorities repoded by activating the Rescue Coordination Center and search

and rescue operations were launched at sea through various agencies to locate



the missing aircraft, according to the airport authority.Aviation expert Imran Aslam told local ARY News that it remains unclear what caused the aircraft to disappear from radar. He said that even if an aircraft suffers an engine failure, it would normally

continue gliding rather than plunge suddenly. "I still cannot understand how the plane went down so abruptly instead of gliding," he said.According to the K2 Airways website, it is a private cargo airline based in Karachi and was established in May 2018. Authorities said Pakistan's military and civilian authorities had deployed multiple air and sea assets for the search and rescue operation. According to multiple officials, the Pakistan Navy frigate PNS Zulfiqar was quickly diverted to the area where contact with the aircraft was lost. They said the Pakistan Air Force had also deployed aircraft for the effort, while a Pakistan Navy ATR aircraft took off from Turbat to assist in the operation.
